Dear Alumni and Friends,

This voyage has been purpose-designed to explore some of the most magnificent ports, towns and ancient sites in the Eastern Mediterranean, places that were considered sacred in antiquity. Indeed, some of them remain holy to this day. The places we will visit are not only renowned for their history, they actually changed the course of history. Their significance shapes our every day life.

Our journey begins in Cyprus, the ancient cultural crossroads of the Eastern Mediterranean and the reputed birthplace of Aphrodite, the goddess of love. Here, we will board the superb new expedition cruise ship *Diana* to sail to Israel, where, over two days, we will tour fabled Jerusalem, sacred to Jews, Christians and Muslims, and other important sites, including Meggido, the site of the apocalyptic battle of Armageddon. We will then continue to Turkey's Mediterranean coast to explore, among other sites, seldom-visited Olbia-Diocaesarea, which was sacred to Zeus.

At the Greek island of Rhodes, we will enter the storied world of the Aegean Sea, Homer's "wine-dark" sea. On the acropolis of Lindos, high above the sea, stands the 4th-century BC Temple of Athena, which attracted pilgrims in antiquity. Ephesus, one of the world's great archaeological sites, was renowned as the center of the mother-goddess Cybele, identified with Artemis-*Diana*, and later the place where St. Paul preached Christianity. Istanbul, the Byzantine Constantinople, was one of the earliest and most important centers of Christianity, its awe-inspiring basilica of Aghia Sophia, the Church of Divine Wisdom, is one of the city's most emblematic buildings since it was built in the 6th century. Legendary Troy is where the Greeks fought the Trojans for ten long years during the Bronze Age, while the small uninhabited island of Delos was considered the birthplace of Apollo and his twin sister Artemis, and therefore sacred to the ancient Greeks.

These are some of the places we will explore aboard the new elegant cruise ship *Diana*, which accommodates only 192 guests in spacious staterooms and balcony suites.

We are most fortunate to have with us two distinguished guest lecturers, Karen Armstrong, one of the world's most influential writers on religion, and Ambassador Richard Erdman, a career diplomat who served in several countries in the Middle East, including, Cyprus, Israel and Turkey. Their deep knowledge of the themes we will explore on this voyage will add depth and meaning and an unparalleled travel experience.

Please join us on this exploration of the Sacred Places of the Mediterranean, a travel-learning experience that will enrich the mind and inspire the senses.

DISTINGUISHED GUEST LECTURERS

Karen Armstrong OBE; FRSL.



Karen Armstrong OBE; FRSL. is the author of numerous books on religion, including *A History of God*, which became an international bestseller. Her other works include *The Battle for God*, *A History of Fundamentalism*; *Islam*; *Buddha*; *The Great Transformation*; *The Case for God*; *Fields of Blood: Religion and the History of Violence*; as well as a memoir, *The Spiral Staircase*. Her most recent work, published in 2019, is *The Lost Art of Scripture; Rescuing the Sacred Texts*. Her books have been translated into 45 languages.

She has addressed members of the US Congress on three occasions and lectured to policy makers at the US State Department. In 2006, she was invited by Kofi Anan to join the High-Level Group of the new UN Alliance of Civilisations; in 2008; She was awarded the Franklin D. Roosevelt Four Freedoms Medal; in 2009, she won the TED Prize and with TED founded the Charter for Compassion, which is now a global movement. From 2008- 2016, she was a Trustee of the British Museum; in 2013, she was awarded the inaugural British Academy Al-Rodhan Prize for Improving Intercultural Relations; in 2017, she was awarded the Princess of Asturias Award for Social Sciences and an OBE. Her new book, *Sacred Nature, How Can We Recover Our Reverence for the Natural world* will be published in the Netherlands in May 2022, in June (UK) and the USA and Canada in September.

Ambassador Richard Erdman



Ambassador Richard Erdman is a retired career diplomat with over 45 years of service. In recent years, he has been called out of retirement to serve in temporary ambassadorial assignments: Senior Area Adviser for the Middle East on the U.S. Delegation to the annual fall UN General Assembly (2008 to the present); interim ambassador to Saudi Arabia (2009); Acting Deputy Secretary of State for Near Eastern Affairs (2012); and Acting U.S. Representative to the UN Economic and Social Council (2015).

Ambassador Erdman served as U.S. ambassador to Algeria, 2003-2006; Director for Syria, Lebanon, and Jordan Affairs (2001-2002); and U.S. Special Envoy and Head of the five-nation Israel-Lebanon Monitoring Group (1998-2000). His earlier postings included Portugal, Washington, Yugoslavia, Cyprus, and Turkey.

Ambassador Erdman has received two Presidential Meritorious Service awards as well as several Department of State awards for distinguished service. He and his wife Sibyl have traveled widely, both personally and professionally. They have two adult children and three grandchildren.

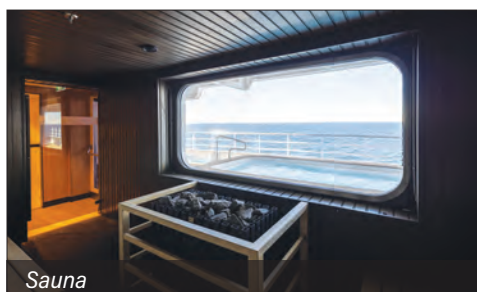

Currently under construction in Finland and launching early February 2023, Swan Hellenic *Diana* is a new-generation expedition cruise ship. Although at 12,100 tons the ship is large enough to accommodate more than 350 passengers, *Diana* accommodates a maximum of 192 guests in 96 spacious staterooms and balcony suites. The low guest density results in one of the most generous indoor and outdoor space-to-guest ratios among cruise ships.

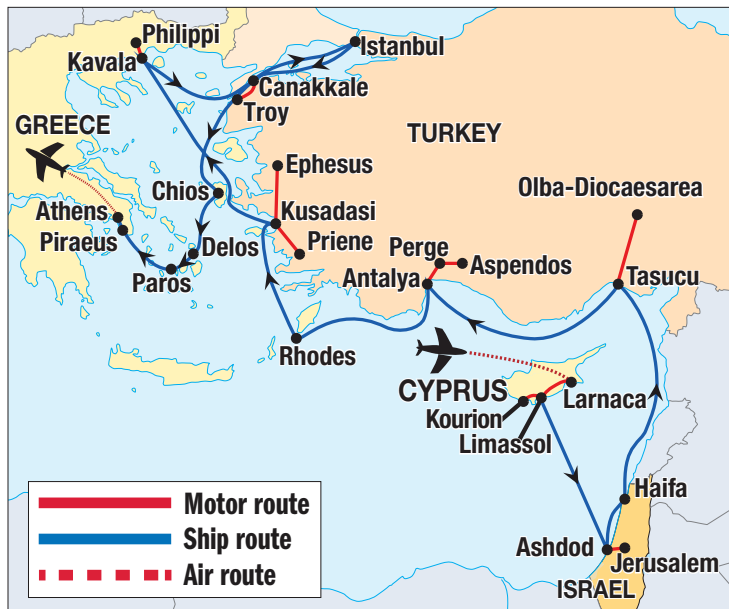
Diana has been designed to meet the stringent requirements of the new Polar Code for ships navigating in Polar regions. Its high PC5 Category A ice-strengthened hull, and other technical and mechanical features, allow the ship to cruise the world's remote regions in safety and utmost comfort. Technologically advanced hybrid engines and a system of powerful batteries make it possible for the ship to cruise in ecologically sensitive areas, leaving minimal footprint, while a computer-controlled Dynamic Positioning System allows the ship to maintain position without anchoring. Operated by a complement of 120 experienced European

officers and international crew members, *Diana* will carry a fleet of Zodiacs, versatile landing boats, and kayaks. Powerful stabilizers provide a smooth ride.

All staterooms and suites face outside and are equipped with private facilities, climate control, TV, Wi-Fi and USB connections as well as other amenities. Of the ship's 96 staterooms, 76 have balconies. Public areas include a spacious observation lounge that is equipped with state-of-the-art facilities for lectures and presentations; a club lounge; a restaurant that accommodates all guests at one seating; an outdoor café/bar that surrounds the heated swimming pool; a wellness area with gym, spa, and sauna that includes an adjoining outdoor jacuzzi; library; beauty salon; a "mud room" with lockers for storing expedition gear; and an infirmary that is attended by a full-time doctor and nurse. The ship also features expansive open-deck areas. Two elevators connect all decks. Attentive service is provided on a 24-hour basis.

ITINERARY



Friday, February 24, 2023

DEPART THE USA: Depart the US for Larnaca, Cyprus.

Saturday, February 25

LARNACA & LIMASSOL, Cyprus: Arrive in Larnaca, site of Cyprus's international airport, and transfer at the Amathus Beach Hotel, located near the town of Limassol. Enjoy a welcome dinner in the evening.

Sunday, February 26

KOURION & EMBARKATION ON *DIANA*: Due to its copper deposits and strategic position in the Eastern Mediterranean, Cyprus attracted settlers since about 10,000 BC. In the 2nd millennium BC, the island was settled by Mycenaean Greeks. After a morning lecture, visit ancient Kourion, founded by Greeks on a beautiful spot, a promontory overlooking the sea. Visit the Sanctuary of Apollo, the superb theater, and other remains. Nearby is the Kolossi Castle, built by the Knights of St. John of Jerusalem in the 13th century. Continue to the port to embark on *Diana* and sail.

Monday, February 27

ASHDOD & JERUSALEM, Israel: From the port of Ashdod, travel for the day to Jerusalem, the ancient city that is holy to Jews, Christians and Muslims. From the Mount of Olives look over the Valley of Kedron, over the olive trees of Gethsemane, at the long walls of Jerusalem. Inside the city walls, walk the Via Dolorosa to the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, built upon the traditional site of the crucifixion, burial and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Visit also the Western Wall, one of the holiest places of Judaism, and the Temple Mount area, as well as the superb Israel Museum. Lunch will be served at a local restaurant.

Tuesday, February 28

HAIFA, NAZARETH & GALILEE OR ACRE, MEGIDDO, BETH SHE'AN & CAESAREA: Built between the sea and the Mount Carmel, Haifa is Israel's principal port. From here, we offer a choice of two full-day excursions. One will explore Nazareth, with the grotto of the Annunciation and the church of St. Joseph; Beth She'arim, a great center of Jewish learning in the early centuries AD; Beth Alpha, site of a 6th century AD synagogue; Capernaum, on the north side of the Sea of Galilee; and Tabgha, the traditional site of the miracle of the loaves and fishes. Alternatively, visit, Acre, the Biblical Accho and one of Israel's most picturesque towns; Beth She'an, and ancient city with eighteen superimposed levels of occupation going back to the fourth millennium; Meggido, the fabled Armageddon; and Caesarea, founded by Herod in 22 BC.

Wednesday, March 1

OLBA-DIOCAESAREA, Turkey: From Turkey's port of Tasucu, travel through the beautiful countryside of ancient Cilicia to the 4th-century BC site of Olba-Diocaesarea. Founded by Selucus I Nikator, a general under Alexander the Great and one of his successors, the site is located in a striking spot in the foothills of the Taurus Mountains and is renowned for its imposing Temple of Zeus Olbios. Returning to the ship, stop in Silifke, the ancient Seleucia, to visit the grotto-church dedicated to St. Thekla.

Thursday, March 2

ANTALYA, PERGE & ASPENDOS: Situated at the head of a wide bay, Antalya provides easy access to two important ancient sites of what was once Pamphylia, Perge and Aspendos. According to legend, Perge was founded by Greeks after the Trojan War, and was the place where St. Paul landed on his first missionary journey. Most of the remains of the city we see today date from the Hellenistic and Roman periods. Aspendos reached its golden age in the reign of the Roman Emperor Marcus Aurelius (AD 161-180). Of the extensive remains the chief monument is the splendid theater, which is considered to be among the best preserved from antiquity.

Friday, March 3

RHODES, Greece: Sacred to Helios, the sun god, Rhodes was the site of the Colossus, a huge statue dedicated to Helios that was one of the Seven Wonders of the Ancient world. The island thrived

during the Classical and Hellenistic periods, becoming a major maritime center and place of learning and the arts. Tour in the morning the Old Town, one of the best-preserved walled medieval towns in Europe. In the afternoon, drive to the village of Lindos. With its white-washed houses built below the towering Acropolis, Lindos presents one of the prettiest sights in the Greek archipelago. The Acropolis is crowned with the 4th-century BC Temple of Athena, a pilgrimage site in antiquity.

Saturday, March 4

KUSADASI, PRIENE & EPHEBUS, Turkey: Arrive in the morning in Kusadasi, on Turkey's Aegean coast. Drive to Priene, which dates from the 4th century BC, and is known today for the exceptional quality of its buildings. In the afternoon, tour Ephesus, one of the world's great ancient sites. Renowned as the center of worship of the mother-goddess Cybele, later known as Artemis, Ephesus was also the place where St. Paul preached Christianity (AD 52 -54). See the stunning façade of the Library of Celsus, the Temple of Hadrian, the Theater and other buildings.

Sunday, March 5

KAVALA & PHILIPPI, Greece: Located in northern Greece, Kavala is the ancient port town of Neapolis, where St. Paul landed in AD 49 on his way to Philippi. We will also drive to Philippi, which was founded in the 4th century BC by Phillip II, the father of Alexander the Great. In 42 BC, the armies of Brutus and Cassius fought the forces of Antony and Octavian in the plain of Philippi. It is believed that St. Paul delivered here his first sermon on European soil and baptized the first convert, St. Lydia. We will explore the substantial remains of the site.

Monday, March 6

TROY, Turkey: Located on the south shore of the narrow channel of the Dardanelles, the port of Canakkale is our gateway to storied Troy, where excavations, began in the second half of the 19th century, have revealed nine different layers of cities superimposed in rings on a massive mound. As Homer recounts in the Iliad, one of these cities is where the Greeks fought the Trojans. After ten years of war, the city of King Priam finally fell to Odysseus's ruse of the Trojan Horse.

Tuesday, March 7

ISTANBUL: Founded by Greeks in the 7th century BC and named Byzantium, in AD 324, Emperor Constantine made the city the capital of the Roman Empire and named it after himself,

Constantinople. For over 1,000 years, it was the capital of the Byzantine Empire and the most resplendent city in Europe, and from the mid-15th century the capital of the Ottoman Empire. Tour Istanbul's Byzantine and Ottoman main landmark sites, including the underground Basilica Cistern; the incomparable Aghia Sophia, the Church of Divine Wisdom; the Blue Mosque; and the Topkapi Palace, the residence of the sultans for three centuries. You may wish to visit the city's colorful bazaars.

Wednesday, March 8

CHIOS, Greece: The reputed birthplace of Homer, the prosperous island of Chios is known for its beautiful landscapes, historic sites and old villages. Visit the 11th-century Monastery of Nea Moni, a UNESCO World Heritage site and one of the most important Byzantine monuments in Greece, sited majestically in a wooded vale and famed for its architecture and exquisite frescoes and mosaics. In the town of Chios, visit the Archaeological Museum, whose exhibits chronicle the island's long history.

Thursday, March 9

DELOS & PAROS: Spend the morning in the small island of Delos, one of the most significant archaeological sites in Greece. Delos was sacred to ancient Greeks because it was identified as the birthplace of twins Apollo and Artemis. A walking tour of this large open-air museum leads to the remains of the main shrines and others structures. Over lunch aboard, sail to nearby Paros, famed in antiquity for its fine-quality white marble. Spend time at leisure in the island's main town, which features the characteristic white-wash architecture of the Cycladic islands.

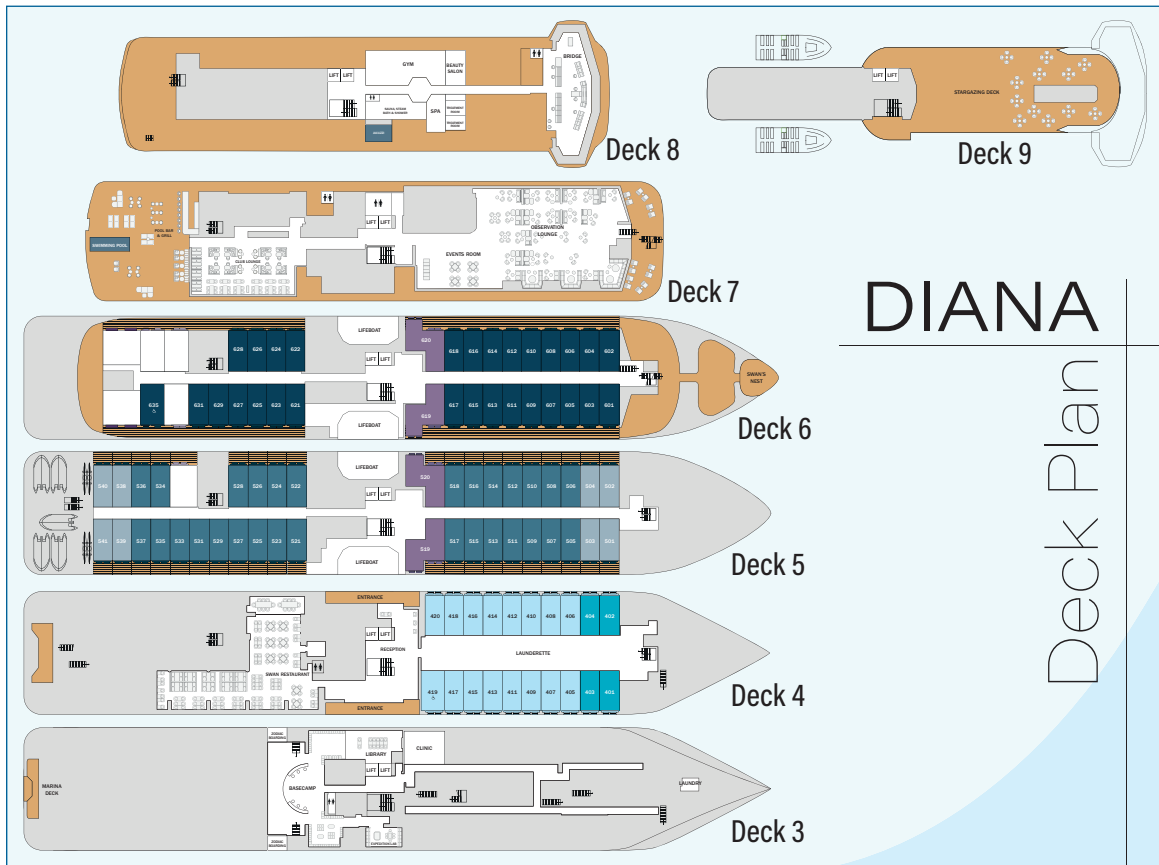
Friday, March 10

ATHENS/USA: Disembark in the morning at Athens's port, Piraeus, and transfer to the airport for the return flight home.
